

RED TOP CAB

Arlington Cab Driver Honored as Taxi Driver of the Year

Red Top Cab driver **Jerome Green** was named 2012 Taxi Driver of the Year at the Taxicab, Limousine & Paratransit Association's 94th Annual Convention and Trade Show in October. **Green**, a native Arlingtonian, graduate of Washington-Lee High School and **Red Top Cab** driver since 1987, has received numerous community service awards including Gold Star Awards, an Arlington Community Hero Award and recognition by the Arlington Retired Teachers Association for his role in a **Red Top Cab** initiative providing free transportation for children participating in an early morning tutoring program. **Green** is also credited with saving the life of an elderly customer who called him regularly for service. When she didn't call, he went to her home to check on her. Getting no response from knocking on the door, he called for emergency assistance, who then arrived on scene and found the senior lying on the floor unable to call for help.

The Ritz-Carlton, Pentagon City has a long standing partnership with **Kenmore Middle School**. Since 2010, the students have joined their hotel mentors through the Succeed Through Service volunteering program to work with **Arlington Food Assistance Center (AFAC)**, a community-based non-profit organization that provides supplemental groceries to Arlington neighbors in need. Proud winners of a \$5,000 grant for their meaningful Community Footprints project were the 8th grade students at Kenmore Middle School in Virginia. The students created over 300 shopping bags for visitors to **AFAC** and through their "You CAN Make a Difference" project collected canned food for those in need in the local Arlington community.

Dr. Leonard L. Hamlin Sr.** and the **Macedonia Baptist Church**. Both congregations will be awarded for their efforts to develop on-site affordable housing.

MARYMOUNT UNIVERSITY

Interior Design Department Recognized

Marymount University's Interior Design Department has received the 2012 Potomac Award from the Washington Metropolitan Chapter of the American Society of Interior Designers (ASID). This is the first time that a university has received the prestigious award, which recognizes an individual or institution that has made creative and intellectual contributions to the local society. With expertise in areas from lighting and designing for commercial spaces to historic preservation and sustainable design, **Marymount**'s ID faculty have consistently been leaders in the field. **Professor Jean Freeman** was already focusing on sustainable design in the 1990s and has ensured that sustainability is a consideration across the ID curriculum.

Grant Recognizes Job Placement & Retention Programs

Linden Resources, Inc. recently received a \$750 award from the Excalibur Foundation, Redlands, California, for its job placement and retention programs which help to increase employment opportunities for people with disabilities. In presenting the Excalibur Fund Service Project Award to **Linden Resources**, the Foundation recognized **Linden**'s creative and innovative efforts to respond to the job finding problems of people in the "new normal economy." As the country struggles with persistent unemployment, people with disabilities are impacted to a greater degree than non-disabled workers.

University Helps Drivers Go Green

Virginia Tech has installed two Level 2 charging stations -- capable of charging electric vehicles at both 120V and 240V -- on the P2 level of the public garage at the Virginia Tech Research Center Arlington, 900 North Glebe Road. Depending on the model of the car, it takes three hours or less (at the higher voltage) to charge a half-depleted battery. Credit card payment is required of drivers using the charging stations. **Virginia Tech** was awarded the two charging stations under a grant provided by the ChargePoint America program. The wall-mounted charging stations were provided free of charge. However, the Virginia Tech Foundation, which owns the building in Ballston, paid installation costs and is responsible for maintaining the equipment.

AHC Inc. Honors Outstanding Volunteers

AHC Inc., a nonprofit affordable housing developer, announced its first-ever Volunteer of the Year awards at the organization's Annual Meeting. The awards recognize dedicated volunteers in each of the organization's three educational programs – the After-School program for elementary students, the Teen Tutoring program for middle and high school students, and **AHC**'s Summer Camp, which helps prevent learning loss over the summer for elementary students. Honorees included Bernard Piper, Stephen Peacock and Maria Garcia.



VIRGINIA COOPERATIVE EXTENSION

Providing Education to Meet Community Needs

Did you know that there is an organization in Arlington that provides classes on how to can fruits and vegetables, free financial counseling, answers to your gardening questions, enriching after school activities for youth and much more? **Virginia Cooperative Extension (VCE)** is often referred to as Arlington's best kept secret because its small staff of six provides lots of programs for the community and doesn't find much time for publicity. **VCE** is a service of Virginia's land grant universities: **Virginia Tech** and Virginia State University. The mission is to provide research-based education that responds to community needs and helps people improve their lives. In Arlington, extension agents provide classes in the areas of 4-H/youth development, gardening, nutrition, money management, energy conservation, food safety, tree care and consumer education. Most programs are free of charge and for those that do charge a fee the funds are used just to cover the cost of class materials.

Because **VCE**'s staff is small, the group relies heavily on volunteers. More than 500 volunteers help to deliver **VCE**'s programs in Arlington and truly represent the lifeblood of the organization. When the Master Gardener volunteer program started in the 1970s



it created a new model for training and involving volunteers in program delivery. Providing volunteers with a certain number of hours of training on research-based materials and then asking them to reciprocate with an equal or greater number of volunteer hours has made it possible for Extension to leverage the work of a small staff and create a wider community impact. The success of the Master Gardener model has prompted other Extension programs to copy it for other volunteer programs. In the Arlington office of Virginia Cooperative Extension we currently have several corps of master volunteers in addition to Master Gardeners: Master Naturalists, Tree Stewards, Master Food Volunteers, Master Financial Education Volunteers and Energy Masters. Several of these groups have been training new volunteers this fall.



The newest master volunteer group is the Energy Masters. In 2011, the inaugural year of the program, 34 volunteers received training and 25 got trained in the fall of 2012. These volunteers receive 16 hours of classroom and hands-on training. The training prepares them to provide weatherization and energy efficiency services in low-income apartments in order to help residents lower their utility bills and conserve energy. Volunteers caulk leaks, install outlet gaskets, make plumbing improvements, exchange incandescent light bulbs with compact fluorescent ones, and give residents power strips. In the first year of the program they weatherized and retrofitted 100 apartments and are planning on providing these services to 150 units in year two.

As the Energy Masters completed their training in mid-October the Master Financial Education Volunteers began theirs on October 20th. A group of 14 volunteers came together for 20 hours of training on how to provide financial counseling to individuals and families and how to teach money management classes to groups. After completing their training they are asked to contribute 40 hours over the next twelve months by assisting with

programs like Reality Store and Kids Marketplace (youth financial simulations), teaching classes at homeless shelters and community centers, and providing counseling to very low income residents.

The Master Gardeners wrapped up their ten-week training at the end of November and the Master Food Volunteers will begin their 30 hour training in March.

Artisphere Ends 2012 with Artistic, Fiscal Success

This vision statement is at the core of what has guided Artisphere during the 2012 fiscal year, and what has led to its artistic success and the critical acclaim it received. The 2012 fiscal year was a year of great change: following significant financial difficulty, a new business plan was implemented to create organizational stability and to match Artisphere's fiscal success with its artistic success. Expectations of revenues and ticket sales were appropriately realigned, operational changes were made and fiscal oversight was strengthened. Arlington County committed additional funding, and a new budget – with associated financial goals – was implemented. Executive Director Jose Ortiz brought in new staff to drive revenue and create programming that aligned with Artisphere's mission while achieving popular success. Working with the community, Artisphere created new opportunities for local artists to perform and free programming and workshops for children, families and seniors.

In one year, with a major internal reorganization as well as a new business plan, Artisphere successfully met its budget expectations and while earning critical acclaim and artistic success. Under the leadership of Executive Director Jose Ortiz, Artisphere met the fiscal and operation goals set forth in its business plan, while also providing innovative and critically acclaimed programming that has increased visitorship. Artisphere finished under budget for net tax support at 99.8%. During FY2012 Artisphere received accolades as a venue, as well as critical acclaim for its programming. Expenses were controlled, while revenues were diversified (per the new business plan) with the addition of an event rent-als program as well as programming that attracted greater numbers of attendees. Artisphere's adherence to its vision is at the core of this success and has allowed it to claim an important niche in a region rich with well-established cultural and artistic institutions.

In fulfilling its mission, Artisphere maintained the following core values:

- Build Community: Engage Arlington County, regional, national and international audiences and artists.
- Be Adventurous: Present quality, thought provoking, daring programming in established and emerging disciplines.
- Foster Innovation: Create new forums and incorporate technology for the presentation and discussion of ideas.
- Cultivate Excellence: Operate efficiently and lead by example.

In FY2013, Artisphere will continue to deliver exciting and compelling programming that brings audiences together with living artists, giving insight into the creative process. Educational programming will expand and rental revenues will continue to be diversified as both programs continue to gain momentum. Artisphere's event rentals program continues to grow with nearly 100% of revenue earned in FY2012 already booked in the first quarter of FY2013.

Support of Artisphere – and of the arts in Arlington – is reflective of a core value of Arlington County. As such, Artisphere's model is one that is supported in large part by local tax dollars; net tax support in FY2012 totaled \$2.3 million, approximately 64% of its total budget. Like many arts and cultural institution who receive funding from local and federal government, Artisphere has adopted the same model for funding its operation. For example, 70% of the Smithsonian's budget is supported by the Federal government via tax dollars. Cultural Affairs staff is currently working on the establishment of a 501c3 which will, in the short term, be capable of fundraising for Artisphere and may in the long term assume operational responsibilities.

Creating a Repeatable Client Experience

At the October Roundtable **Todd Ihrig**, Financial Advisor **H.D. Vest Investment Services**, shared his method of sustaining a high level of service to each client.

It is very important to choose the clients you work with. If, for an reason, you are not a good fit it will be more difficult to deliver on the client's expectations. Usually it can be accomplished in a 15-20 minute phone call that makes clear what you are going to deliver and what you expect of the client. If there is any hesitation on the prospect's part, you should seriously question whether it will be a smooth long term relationship.

The process has five steps that are quite repeatable in any industry:

- Requirements (figure out what the client wants and project constraints)
- Design (apply your expertise to propose a solution)
- Implementation (put the plan in motion)
- Testing (evaluate the plan's success/progress)
- Maintenance (ongoing fine-tuning)

As important as any of these core steps is a parallel process that touches all of these: Change Management. External events can affect your performance at any stage and reacting/adjusting in a timely and consistent way is critical.

Ihrig uses three tools to keep track of EVERYTHING:

- Checklists! Everything is a checklist. When first implemented, this becomes a guide until it is a habit. Afterwards, it can become a training guide.
- Outlook: manages contact database/email as well as deadline-based action items;
 Excel Dashboard: puts all high-priority client information in one place including current project "threads." You can easily transition between clients.

There are two parts to the client experience: the outward expression of your process and meeting a client's expectations. One of your primary challenges is that you cannot control the external factors affecting your client's business. Therefore, it is critical to set and manage expectations.
